# Membership

IZE initiated a new membership campaign during the first part of 2010. All members from 2010 received a renewal email letter in December, a second call for renewal in January and a third email, in a new format using an embedded image, in February. In 2011, the site had 153,917 session, with a daily average of 422. There were a total of 639,485 page views, with a daily average of 1,752.



# IZE Board Projects in 2011

This year the IZE Board worked together to develop current, relevant, on-line conservation materials for our members. The first project showcases forest ecosystems around the world in support of the UN's celebration of forests, and the second, features the critical topic of climate change. These excellent additions add to the breadth of our member resources and keep them current on critical threats and positive actions to take for wildlife.

#### UN International Year of the Forest Celebration and Resources

In the first half of the year, IZE Board members joined together to celebrate the UN's International Year of the Forest by creating an online resource of forest lesson plans and conservation actions. A variety of forest ecosystems including bamboo forests of China, rainforests of Colombia and Uganda, and mangrove forests of the U.S., form the foundation of lesson plans from each of these regions. Conservation educators find content, activities and worksheets to use at their own facilities.













### Climate Change

In the second half of the year, the 17 F Board created a resource on climate change. As educators, we may not be experts on the science of climate change, but our expertise does include identifying the critical conservation actions that people can take to alleviate its effects. Working with our 6 international regions, the Board compiled a list of actions that reduce our carbon footprint and, ultimately, may save biodiversity and planet Earth. A large red button appears on the page as a way for members to contact the UN Secretary General, asking for a reduction in global coal burning which has the largest negative impact on climate change conditions. As a resource on the topic of climate change, the report entitled "A Summary of the Science" by the Royal Society appears as a PDF to provide educators with a user-friendly discussion of the topic.

# UN Decade of Biodiversity

At the last WAZA conference, the Executive Director requested that all WAZA institutions support the UN Decade of Biodiversity efforts.

A general discussion among the IZE Board generated a positive interest in building awareness around this important topic. In that spirit, the IZE President and WAZA Executive Director developed a survey to help define what biodiversity programs are currently occurring and what materials are being used and needed to implement these programs. The report has been completed and will be published in our 2012 IZE Journal. A quote from the Report's Summary was especially pertinent to IZE:

"The majority of survey participants believed that there were gaps in zoo and aquarium biodiversity education that were pressing and urgent. Of the respondents who gave insights into what these were, several suggested that there should be more evaluation and monitoring of educational programs. Others felt that there was a basic lack of financial and physical resources available to implement programs. A handful of survey participants also believed that there should be more networking between zoos and aguariums. Some participants suggested practical solutions to needs, such as designing educational resources to help define the term "biodiversity". One of the most useful suggestions was the idea to develop a centralized collection of educational materials such

as lesson plans, photos, and videos. If such a collection were developed, it would help education departments to maximize their potential. An online system of some sort, for example, could help educators share a wide range of resources from lesson plans, to computer wildlife programs, to best practice advice. Such a system could also help to make education departments more efficient because they would not have to "reinvent the wheel" each time they develop new material."

The IZE Board believes that our association conferences are important vehicles for global networking. As well, the IZE website already serves as that "centralized collection of educational materials". We just need to disseminate this message on a broader scale.





#### IZE Finances

IZE totally relies on donations to run our association successfully. For this reason we operate to high standards and strict financial controls. In a non-conference year like 2011, the IZE expenditures were few. 78% of the funds spent went to support the IZE Administrator, with the last quarterly payment occurring in 2012. The printing and mailing of the 2011 IZE Journal accounted for about 10% of the 2011 budget, however the complete cost for the journal was split between 2011 and 2012. All donations are earmarked and used for the intended projects. (Donations were received from: Disney's Animal Kingdom, CHF 4145.75; Zoos Victoria, CHF 2316.30; Hiroyuki Takahashi, CHF 11.50; Mark Norris, CHF 10.83.)





## Fundraising for IZE Grants

Rachel Lowry, IZE's Presidentelect, initiated an ambitious fundraising effort in 2011 to support IZE Grants, our primary funding program. Our goal was to raise \$30,000. At this point, IZE has almost reached the fundraising goal through donations from our Board, our member institutions, and a few individuals. This successful fundraising campaign ensures that we meet our goal of bringing 10 developing country, conservation educators to the IZE Conference in 2012.


